

Appendix D Extra Dialogue

Appendix D is collection of Q&A dialogue sets removed from the script during the process of editing the script and reducing the length of the dramatization. In some instances the dialogue was not entered into the playscript format, but was simply deposited here in this Appendix for the Director to consider. To find the sources (or context) of the dialogue one would need to return to the original transcript of 1864, or the referenced book.

To locate dialogue for specific Witness, determine the **Witness Identification Number** (ID) for that Witness and search the 4th column in the table below for that code. The **Witness Identification Number** (ID) can be located from **Appendix B - Witnesses Roster**.

To locate the dialogue for specific Writer, determine the **Book Identification Number** (ID) for that Writer and search the 4th column in the table below for that code. The **Book Identification Number** (ID) can be located from **Appendix C - Writers Roster**.

cursing the boys that were wounded. They shot one of them about the hand, aimed to shoot him in the head, as he lay on the ground, and hit him in the hand; and an officer told the secesh soldier if he did that again he would arrest him, and he went off then.

NARRATOR Union Soldiers, white and black, often referred to Confederate soldiers as: "secesh", short for "secessionists". 111S N01

BLACK SOLDIER Yes, sir; I was a gunner No. 2 at the gun. 113C W04

Turtledove Bradford?" Wade asked. "He escaped unhurt,
(continued) as far as the battle was concerned,"
Leaming answered. "I was told the next
morning on the boat that he had been
paroled. I did not see him after that
night."
